Shepody Trail Development and Grand Reopening



Love Your Trails, Love Your Community!

The Shepody Trail spans almost 12 km from Riverside-Albert to Daniel's Flats in Shepody, travelling along an old rail bed and dykes and has recently been redesignated as a greenway portion of the Trans Canada Trail. Plan360 is currently developing the trail as part of a much larger trail project: The Shore-Line Trail, which will run 170 km along the Bay of Fundy and connect the major tourist hubs of Shediac and Alma as well as many points in between.

Over the past several months the Chipoudy Communities Revitalization Committee (CCRC) and Friends of Fundy have partnered with Plan360 to host conversations with community members and experts in the field to create a local trail strategy for the Shepody Trail, focusing on trailhead signage, community engagement, trail maintenance, and events.

With the new signage getting ready to go in this spring, it was decided to have a **Grand Reopening** of the trail on **June 4th**, International Trails Day. This daylong event will include activities for volunteers and visitors, including trail clean up, hiking and biking activities, wagon rides (from Broadleaf), geocaching (organized by Bayview Chalets & Motel), a raffle basket of local goods, activities from Fundy National Park, food, and music!

The volunteer and community activities are still being developed, so keep a look-out for more information as things come together!



As we get ready to open the 2022 season on May 20, Fundy National Park is looking forward to welcoming visitors. Whether you are planning your trip as a regular visitor or for the first time, Fundy National park has something for everyone!

Campers can experience the great outdoors through one of our five distinct front-country campgrounds or, for the more adventurous, via one of our eight back-country campsites. Make overnight getaways even easier by booking one of our Ôasis, oTENTik or yurt units, or opt for an authentic rustic cabin.

Day visitors also have a variety of choices to enjoy the great outdoors from swimming in our heated salt-water pool (opening late June), to golfing on our signature 9-hole course, to exploring the muddy floor of the ocean, to fat biking, paddling, kayaking, fishing, or just lounging in one of our famous red chairs. Not to mention hiking on trails with soaring coastal views, stunning waterfalls or that take you deep into the Acadian forest.

Return of the Bat?

There's more to Fundy National Park than awesome trails, stunning vistas, and cozy campgrounds - it **also** hosts over 300 individual species of various mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians, and fish (let's leave the insects out of it for now).

In recent years bat observations in Fundy National Park have been scarce, in part due to white-nose syndrome that decimated populations of certain species of bat such as *Myotis*. Over the past year and a half, however, big brown bats have been observed and researchers at the Park were curious if any other species were present.

Researchers installed acoustic recorders around the Park and analyzed the unique ultrasonic signatures in the recordings and to their surprise they found evidence of all **seven** bat species known to New Brunswick, including two *Myotis* species **and** a species that hasn't been observed in the Park since 2013!


Regional Destination Development Project



The Rural Upper Bay Of Fundy Regional Destination Development Project is the first-ever community-led regional development process for the area that stretches from Hillsborough, Riverside-Albert, Alma through Sussex, St. Martins, and the adjacent rural areas.

The initiative brings together residents, business owners, non-profit managers, and local municipal officials to develop a plan that reflects the area's unique community assets and opportunities to build a sustainable tourism network.

The project is wrapping up its first phase, which focused on research, data collection, analysis, and conversations within with the working group. Phase 2 will see members of the working group meeting with communities and stakeholders to share their research, exchange information and perspectives, and take action on recommendations.
